

Finishing touch

A young and relentless Hill-Murray squad tops Eden Prairie for a fourth state title

They came in green and black waves, different sizes and tendencies but a shared relentlessness.

Hill-Murray boys' hockey coach Bill Lechner joked his team, led by only six seniors, was young on paper.

On the other bench, Eden Prairie relished the chance to redeem last season's overtime loss in the Class 2A state championship game. Eagles coach Lee Smith, overseeing an already deep team supplemented by three standout players new to the fold this season, said the team that wants it most would pre-

On Saturday, Hill-Murray was that team. Inspired play throughout fueled the Pioneers' 4-1 victory and fourth state championship in program history. The Maplewood private school's previous titles came in 1983, 1991 and 2008.

"We finished this off," Strobel said after the game. "I told all these 20 working guys that we're gonna finish it tonight. And we did it."

Bad news threatened No. 5 seed Hill-Murray's chances to win even before puck drop. Junior defenseman Joey Palodichuk, a Star Tribune All-Metro third-team selection who made a verbal commitment to Wisconsin, was scratched from

the lineup.

But a shorthanded Hill-Murray team received the game's first power play and made good on the opportunity. Defenseman Matthew Fleishhacker's 10th goal of the season put the Pioneers (21-6-3) ahead 1-0 at the first intermission.

On paper, Fleishhacker and the diminished defensive crew looked suspect. Hill-Murray used two sets of defensemen (senior Seamus O. Regan with sophomore Axel Bagley and

junior Matthew Fleishhacker with sophomore Luke Hause) with sophomore Leo Gruba receiving spot shifts

They were more than capable of slowing No. 3 seed Eden Prairie (24-5-1) and the Eagles' offensive weapons. Senior goaltender Remington Keopple held the Eagles scoreless into the third period. But his blue line corps deserved credit for permitting 22 shots and few second chances.

"Our defense kept them to the outside and our forwards were blocking shots all game," Keopple said. "It made my job a lot easier."

Relentless Hill-Murray opened the second period with sophomore forward Nick Pierre sending a puck off the crossbar on Hill-Murray's first rush

Then senior forward Owen Quast, who Lechner has called "the little engine that could," corralled the puck near the red line and headed for the Eden Prairie zone. His shot whizzed over goalie Axel Rosenlund's stick and put the Pioneers ahead 2-0 at 3:46

Strobel tightened Hill-Murray's grip on the Eagles with a play combining his skill and determination. Stro-

bel maneuvered around defenseman Mason Langenbrunner, then continued behind the net before depositing a wraparound goal from the back side. That gave Hill-Murray a 3-0 lead with less than two minutes to go in the second period.

Ben Steeves gave Eden Prairie a spark with a goal at 5:49 of the third period. An Eagles team that had not been outworked since an early February loss, a team that in Smith's words was "in total control" of its first two state tournament games, got the opposite results in the championship game.

Hill-Murray's metamorphosis into a championship contender began early in January with a three-game slump. Injury and illness thinned the Pioneers' lineup, and the resulting losses to Benilde-St. Margaret's, Mahtomedi and Wayzata forced a regroup.

Lechner praised his team for consistent effort at practice. His senior group, while not impressive in number, played roles with vigor. Strobel was "the heartbeat," Seamus O. Regan "the father figure," and Henry Eischen and Keopple the quiet leaders by example.

Together, they leave Hill-Murray as state champions.

Strobel provides goals, leadership

The Hill-Murray captain added to the family hockey legend.

The goals were gorgeous. And incredibly clutch. The celebrations were wildly epic, too.

But senior Charlie Strobel's most important contribution to Hill-Murray's Class 2A championship season came long before he stepped onto the Xcel Energy Center ice Saturday night.

"Charlie was huge this summer on building camaraderie, taking the young guys out with the old guys," Hill-Murray coach Bill Lechner said. "That's not a guarantee for success, but you could see it coming."

Strobel, whose late second-period goal put the Pioneers ahead by three en route to their 4-1 victory over Eden Prairie, oozes all the traits coaches crave from their leaders. Selflessness, toughness, relentlessness.

He's the first at practice and last to leave. Never coasts through a drill. Says all the right things in the locker room and in postgame media sessions, when the answers are short and all about team, team, team.

Lechner, in his 23rd season leading the Pioneers, has had an abundance of great captains. A common trait binds them all, he said.

"He's got to be respected," Lechner said. "I use the analogy, in our coaching staff, as the leader of this group, if I'm sitting there with a cigarette, out of shape, with a beer in hand and going, 'You guys gotta behave and work hard.' Yeah, credibility is gone.

"So Charlie is that voice. But he lives it."

The Pioneers were leading 2-0 with less than two minutes left in the second period when Strobel wheeled down the left boards. He went behind the Eden Prairie goal and — with feet still churning — wrapped around the net and stuffed the puck inside the right post. As pandemonium ensued, Strobel pulled his jersey from his chest, showing off the Hill-Murray

crest to the crowd, before leaping into a mosh pit of teammates at the bench.

Strobel scored again late in the third to put the Pioneers ahead 4-1 and all but secure the victory.

The goals, Strobel's 26th and 27th of the season, add another volume to the Strobel family legend. Twin brothers Mike — Charlie's dad — and Mark Strobel were the twin engines who powered Hill-Murray to the 1991 state championship.

Earlier this season, Charlie said his dad doesn't talk often about his championship exploits.

"I think he's letting me create my own path here at Hill-Murray," Charlie said. "I respect that."

Charlie shares the intensity displayed by his dad and uncle when they were hard-driven players who would settle for nothing less than a championship.

"Sometimes it's like, 'Take a chill pill, kid,'" Lechner said.
